

MANAGING IN A TIME OF CHANGE Fall NOCALL Workshop By Joan Howland

One of the major challenges facing law librarians during the next decade is continuing to provide superior service and efficiently managing staffs and collections while effectively responding to changing legal and economic situations. The NOCALL workshop entitles "Managing in a Time of Change:Management Issues of the 90's" was held on November 13, 1991 at the Hotel Nikko in San Francisco. Coordinated by Leslie Hesdorfer, Head Librarian at Hancock Rothert and Bunshoft and Joan Howland, Deputy Director of the Boalt Hall Law Library, the day-long program focused on the issue of how librarians can most effectively and cost efficiently respond to the increasing information needs of attorneys, judges, faculty and students. The workshop also focused on legal and ethical issues facing law librarians.

The workshop, which attracted over one hundred participants, opened with a keynote address by Robert C. Berring, Professor of Law and Law Librarian at Boalt Hall School of Law. Professor Berring discussed the management and motivation of library staff in times of economic change. He emphasized that during periods of layoffs, delayed pay raises and decreased budgets, librarians need to devise creative methods to keep employees interested in their work and motivated to provide the highest quality of work possible. By being as open as possible with staff about the economic realities connected with acquisition costs and operating expenses, Professor Berring felt that staffs would be more willing to help find solutions to the situation rather than feeling victimized by it. He also emphasized that the 1990s is a time for creative thinking and for librarians to break away from traditional organizational and management patterns.

Law librarians are becoming increasingly concerned with the legal aspects of management such as disciplining employees, providing references, and implementing sick leave policies. Michael Loeb, a partner at Crosby, Heafey, Roach and May, offered a substantive presentation outlining the legal guidelines for dealing with such situations. He encouraged librarians to stay current with the ever-changing law in this area and to pay particular attention to the differences between state and federal regulations in regard to such matters as maternity/paternity leave.

A session entitles "Responding Effectively to Our Bosses--What Do Deans, Partners, Legal Administrators and Judges Want from Their Libraries and Librarians?" challenged librarians to look at services and operations from the perspective of their employers. George Marley, chief Operating Officer from the Sacramento firm Kronick Moskovitz Tiedemann and Girard, emphasized that especially during these times of economic uncertainty, librarians need to increasingly analyze their operations in terms of costbenefit. He also encouraged librarians to think like entrepreneurs running their own service business.

Librarians are continually being forced to recognize and handle sensitive ethical situations. A panel of librarians from various types of libraries and with a variety of responsibilities discussed issues ranging from accepting expensive holiday gifts from vendors to inter-office dating, to discovering that a colleague lied on his/her resume. The panelists, Edward Hosey from the U.S. Court of Appeals, Lee Ryan from the University of San Francisco, Marci Hoffman from Boalt Hall, Myra Saunders from UCLA, Leslie Rosenfeld from Graham and James, and Maureen Sirhall from Littler Mendelson et al., offered a spirited discussion which illustrated that the response to many ethical dilemmas is far from clear cut. The discussion also revealed that the practical response to an ethical situation is not always the ideal response.

The workshop ended with four concurrent roundtable discussions on topics of growing concern to librarians. Alice McKenzie of Brobeck Phleger and Harrison, and Leslie Rosenfeld led a discussion on branch libraries. With an increasing number of firms establishing offices in several cities, library administrators are faced with staffing, collection development, and general management problems. Kay Starkweather of the University of California, Berkeley University Library coordinated an interactive session on techniques for managing difficult employees. The discussion focused on the need for establishing clear guidelines and standards for employees who are exhibiting disruptive and/or non-productive behaviors in the work environment. Myra Saunders led the roundtable on effective recruiting, interviewing, and hiring. This is an especially timely topic due to the closure of library schools throughout the nation and the difficulty law librarians are experiencing in finding qualified candidates for posted positions. The fourth concurrent session, led by Marci Hoffman, focused on legal assistants as library users. Ms. Hoffman led a discussion on the particular problems encountered in firm, academic, and public libraries when legal assistants approach librarians with difficult research questions which have been assigned by supervising attorneys. The discussion focused on the role librarians can take in training and supporting legal assistants and researchers. ALA SMALL FIRM MANAGEMENT SECTION; "WHAT TO DO WHEN YOU DON'T HAVE A LIBRARIAN"

U.C. BERKELEY EXTENSION COURSES

Two UC Berkeley Extension course of special interest to law librarians will be offered this spring. "Environmental Information Online II: Business and Law" will be held Thursday, April 9, 1992 from 9-4:30 at the UC Extension Center, 55 Laguna St., San Francisco. Linda Sunnen, head librarian, Environmental Protection Agency Region 9, and Sharon Brunzel, research librarian at Failure Analysis Associates, will discuss new approaches and effective strategies for using commercial and EPA databases to answer environmental business and law questions. Cost for the course is \$135, including course workbook.

"Accessing Medical and Health Information: Strategies for Legal and Special Libraries" will be taught by Rochelle Perrine Schmalz, director of library services at St. Mary's Hospital and Medical Center. The course will be held on Thursday, April 30, 9-4 at St. Mary's Hospital and Medical Center, Stanyan and Masonic, San Francisco. The course fee of \$150 includes a hands-on tour of the medical library.

Other UC Berkeley Extension courses offered this spring include "Cataloging in an Online Environment," "Information Brokering: Is This Career for You?" "Stress Management for Librarians and Library Personnel," "Careers in Library Technical Assistance," "How to Find Clients: Marketing an Information Business," "An Introduction to Online Searching" and "Hands-On Introduction to Online Searching." COPYRIGHT SUIT SETTLED

Washington Business Information Incorporated, publishers of the <u>Product Safety Letter</u>, have settled their suit with Collier, Shannon & Scott for an undisclosed amount. The publisher sued over the issue of the firm photocopying entire newsletters and routing the copies to members of the firm. In addition to a monetary settlement, Collier, Shannon & Scott will assist the American Bar Association and American Newsletter Publishers Association to develop a policy to clarify photoduplication policies.

In a related note, the publication <u>Law Office Management and Administration</u> <u>Report</u> noted in their November 1991 issue that "LOMAR's policy has been to assist firms in improving management by allowing reasonable photocopying and distribution within subscribing firms." They also give a large discount for multiple subscriptions within the same firm.


