Our Village: The Orbis Cascade Alliance

37 academic libraries in Idaho, Oregon, and Washington

- -6 community colleges
- I6 private 4-year colleges
- I4 public 4-year colleges (large & small)
- I Health Sciences institution
- -Total FTE: 250,000



The Cooperative Vision and E-books?

- The Alliance had a vision of "many libraries, one collection" BUT
- Individual libraries were purchasing single ebook titles or collections
- Purchased e-books were not available to all Alliance libraries



The Vision and E-books: New Directions

In 2010 ...


- E-book Investigation Team formed
- Team recommends EBL's Demand Driven Acquisitions (DDA) model, in partnership with YBP, our preferred book vendor
- Alliance Council charges Implementation
 Team



DDA Model

- Users discover DDA titles in their local catalog, or the Alliance Group Catalog
- Free browse for 5 minutes
- A Short Term Loan (STL) occurs if the title is used > 5 minutes, or copy/printing content
- STL is a "rental" averaging 14% of list
- Title is purchased when a predetermined number of STLs occur; there is a negotiated consortial multiplier (5)
- Transparent to user



Benefits of Demand Driven Acquisitions

- Access to thousands of titles
- Expenditures based only on use
- Once a title is purchased, continued use is free
- Ongoing staff workload is minimal
- Elimination of staff costs to process borrowing requests
- Gives libraries with little ebook experience a way to enter the game



DDA Pilot on Fast Track!

Planning & implementation: Jan.-July 2011

- 15 publishers come on board
- Profile set up with YBP (all subjects; \$250 cap)
- Workflows mapped for discovery options
- Training offered to public service & technical service librarians



Spending Plan

Impacted by <u>content</u> pool, short-term loan (<u>STL</u>) threshold, and negotiated multiplier


- Began with 1,700 titles (2011-2012), with ongoing weekly additions; now ~12,000
- Team did one special load & one removal project in response to spending trends
- Varying STL threshold (btwn 5 & 15, plus temporary suspension)

Finances


- FY 2012 (\$462K)
- FY 2013 (\$750K)
- FY 2014 (\$IM)

 Funding model now 30% even split/35% FTE/35% materials budget – may be tweaked again

Challenges

- Range of experience with ebooks & DDA among libraries; marketing issue
- Differing perceptions of value
- Technical issues
- Access for non-affiliated users not feasible
- Publishers can change prices, terms on titles



It All (or mostly) Boils Down to \$\$

- As title pool increases, so does spend
- Constant need to monitor expenditures and be prepared to take action
 - Fall 2012 content removal project
 - Have not been able to add publishers as planned

An Open Question: Is This Sustainable?

- Budget unlikely to increase in FY14
- What happens if publishers want to change their terms?
- Do we let go of ownership?
- Consider other models that limit simultaneous user access?

Some Statistics (July 2011-March 2013)

- 11,497 titles available to users (19,500 at highest count)
- ~ 200 new titles added per week
- 964 titles purchased
- 16,626 titles were accessed 158,491 times (this includes free browsing)
- 12,843 titles had 39,682 STLs
- \$1,045,074 spent
